Public Meeting with Adam Lacher of Habitat for Humanity 7 Rivers

About Habitat for Humanity 7Rivers:

- "Where Everyone Has a Place to Live"
- Three Key Programs:
 - New Build Program
 - Critical Home Repair and Weatherization Program
 - ReStore for repurposed building materials

New Build Program

- Builds houses in collaboration with qualifying individuals and the community for home ownership
- Qualifications:
 - \circ $\;$ Currently live in substandard housing
 - A minimum credit score of 640.
 - Earn no more than 80% of the area median income (AMI, see below)

- Complete the Maine HoMEworks course offered by CEI or other local organizations
- Complete 200 hours of volunteer labor per adult in the household
- Qualify for an affordable mortgage through Rural Development (Direct or Guarantee).
- Current cost: \$225,000 plus 30% for the added costs of an island
- Flexibility when it comes to whether the house is on its own lot, part of a larger group of houses, etc.
- Works to guarantee that houses will be not be bought and flipped
 - A "silent second" mortgage held by Habitat, which covers the difference between what the homeowner pays and what the house cost to build
 - A collaborative process to design and build the home that ensures homeowner investment in the property
 - An openness to working with a community housing trust, with caveats about developing clarity about who is responsible for a property if the housing trust no longer exists

What Habitat Brings to the Project

- Funding
- Fundraising through grants
- Volunteer Labor
- Application and vetting process for potential homeowners
- Builder's Insurance
- Community Trust through Habitat's global reputation

What the Community Brings to the Project

- Information
 - What is the demand for Habitat for Humanity among qualified participants?
 - Who is willing to volunteer from the local trades?
 - What is the buy-in from the community, including individuals, non-profits, and the town?
 - Who are other state partners or agencies that can commit to this work?
 - [There are currently several with significant funding that could be used for this and other projects, if that funding is applied for quickly.]
 - How does zoning impact this project?
- Resources
 - $\circ \quad \text{Donated Land} \quad$
 - Fundraising
 - In-kind donations, which could include time from tradespeople, the town agreeing to build roads and hook up electricity, etc.
